Census Records Available Would you like a copy?

The online information on the Internet continues to increase. 30 years ago I went through most every page of the 1850 New York census on microfilm looking for Vincent family members. Now it is a simple matter of typing in names and all of the information appears instantaneously on the computer screen. All of the census years available are now indexed and for a reasonable fee they are readily available for searching at ancestry.com. I have used it to help construct new family information previously unavailable.

For privacy, the rules are that the census records are only available 70 years after the census and 1930 is the most recent census. If you were old enough to have been recorded in that census or have grandparents or aunts and uncles that were, I would be happy to print a copy for you to have. Cecil LaVerne Vincent 1925-2004 (VF #4018)

ROCHESTER, NY — Cecil L. Vincent died on September 3, 2004 in Rochester, NY after a long illness. He was 79. He was born July 15, 1925 in Adair Co., IA, the son of Earl Leo and Cassie Reese Vincent. He grew up during the depression on farms in Iowa, Missouri, and Minnesota. He graduated in 1943 from high school in Chadwick, MO. In 1946 he served in the Army with the forces in Japan. Using the GI Bill he went to telegraphy school and worked for the railroad first as telegrapher for the Northern Pacific Railway, then Wire Chief in Fargo, ND and then a system analyst in St. Paul, MN for the Burlington Northern Railway. He retired in 1981 and lived in Springfield, MO, Austin, MN and Burnsville, MN before moving to Rochester, NY to live with his son.

He was an avid amateur radio operator, attaining the extra classification. His radio call sign was WØUM. He achieved radio contacts with every county in the United States on three different occasions. He also enjoyed bowling, gardening, and genealogy.

He is survived by his loving wife of 58 years, Dagmar; children Sheridan Vincent, Rochester, NY; Cynthia (Mrs. David) Merhar, Ham Lake, MN and Erick Vincent and Susan, Bainbridge Island, WA; two grandsons, Andrew Merhar and William Merhar; a sister, Thelma Rowe, Des Moines, IA, and a brother, Clare Vincent, Albert Lea, MN.
